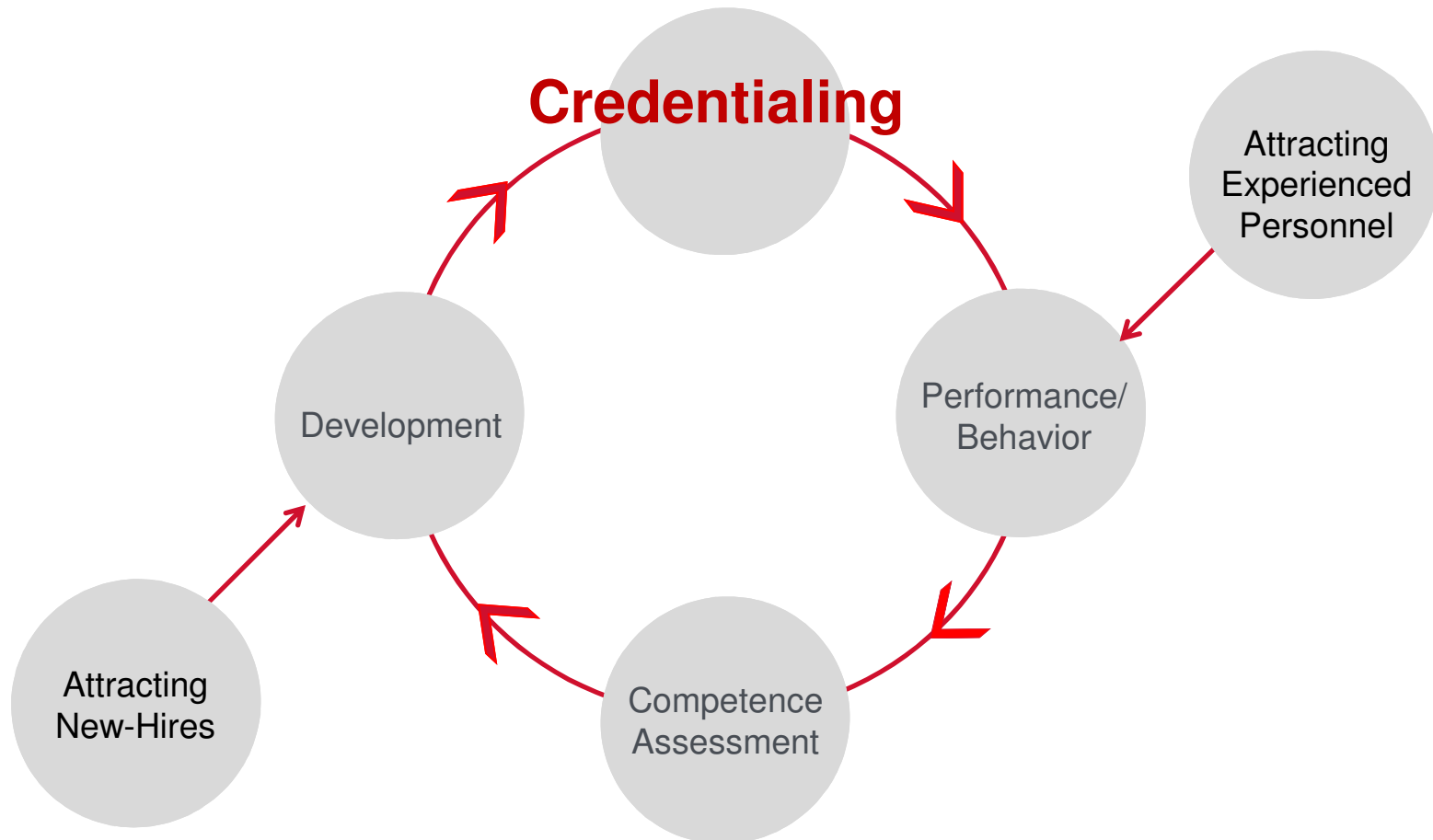

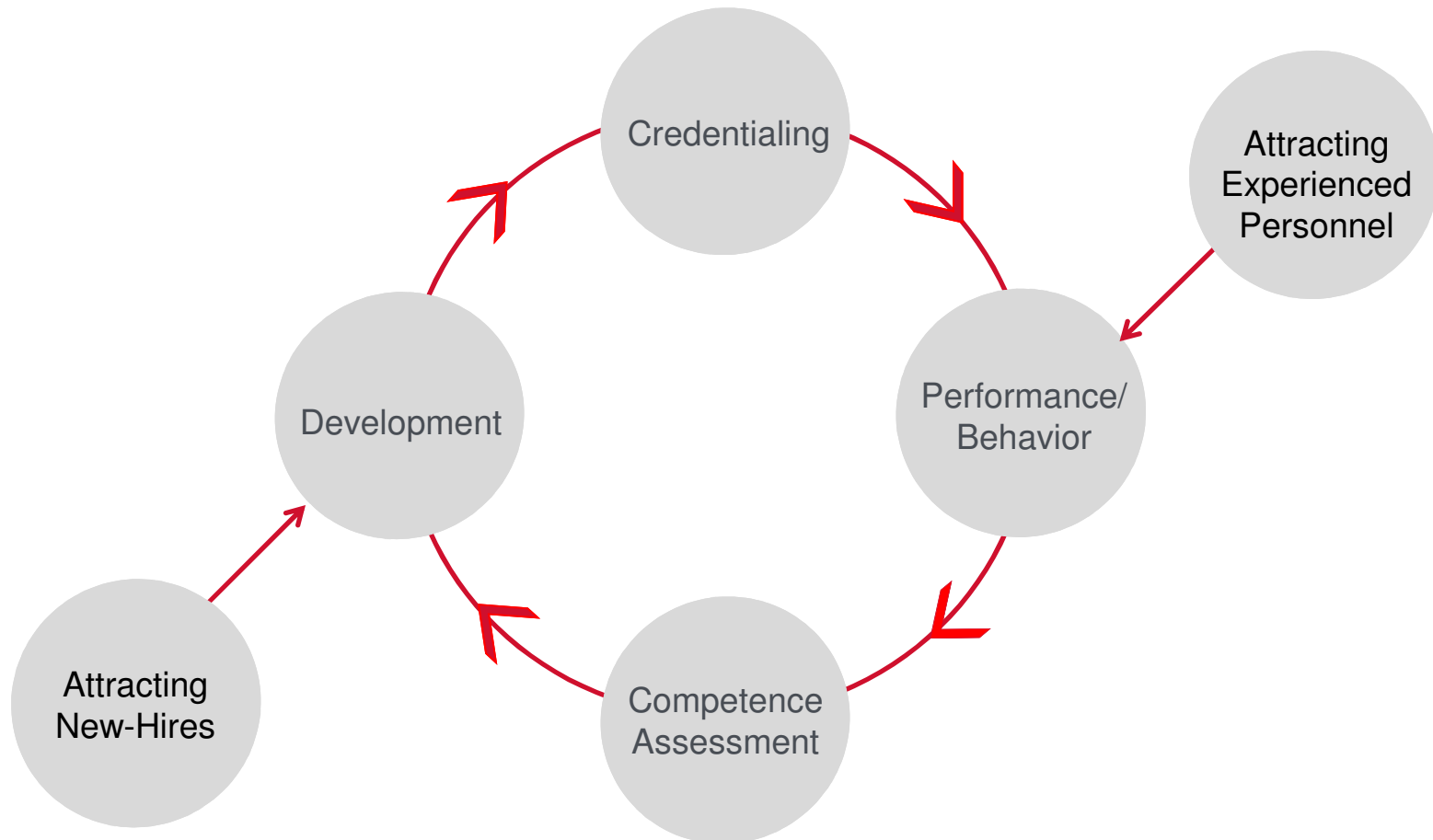
Adequacy of Current Training and Certification

- The oil & gas industry workforce is being trained, both internally and through third-party providers.
- Training is often to a high standard, but not necessarily to an industry-defined standard that aims to assure consistency of performance across the industry.
- Workers in certain safety-critical areas need training and/or more standardized training.
- Team-based and behavioral-based training is currently under-utilized, and warrants expanded utilization.

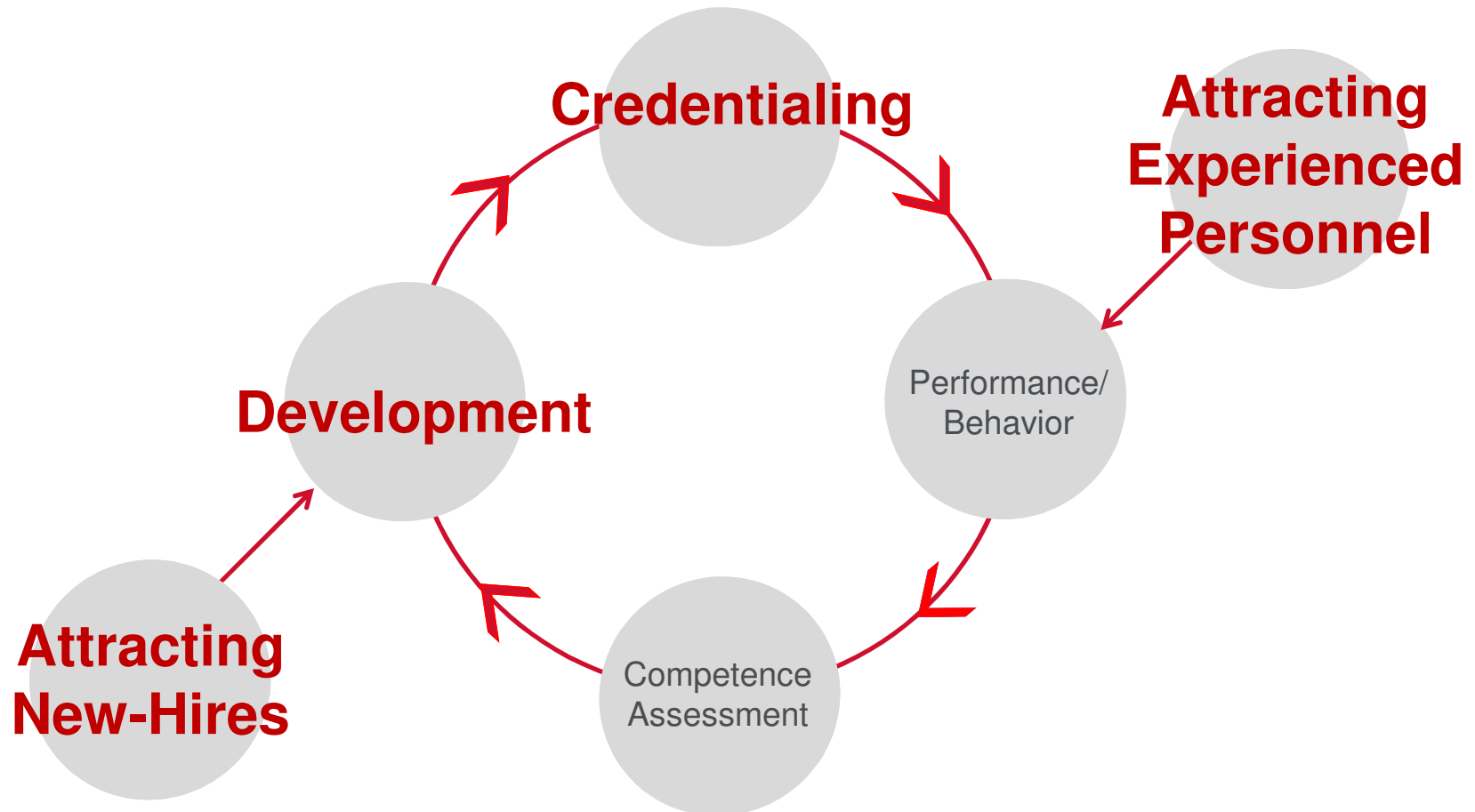

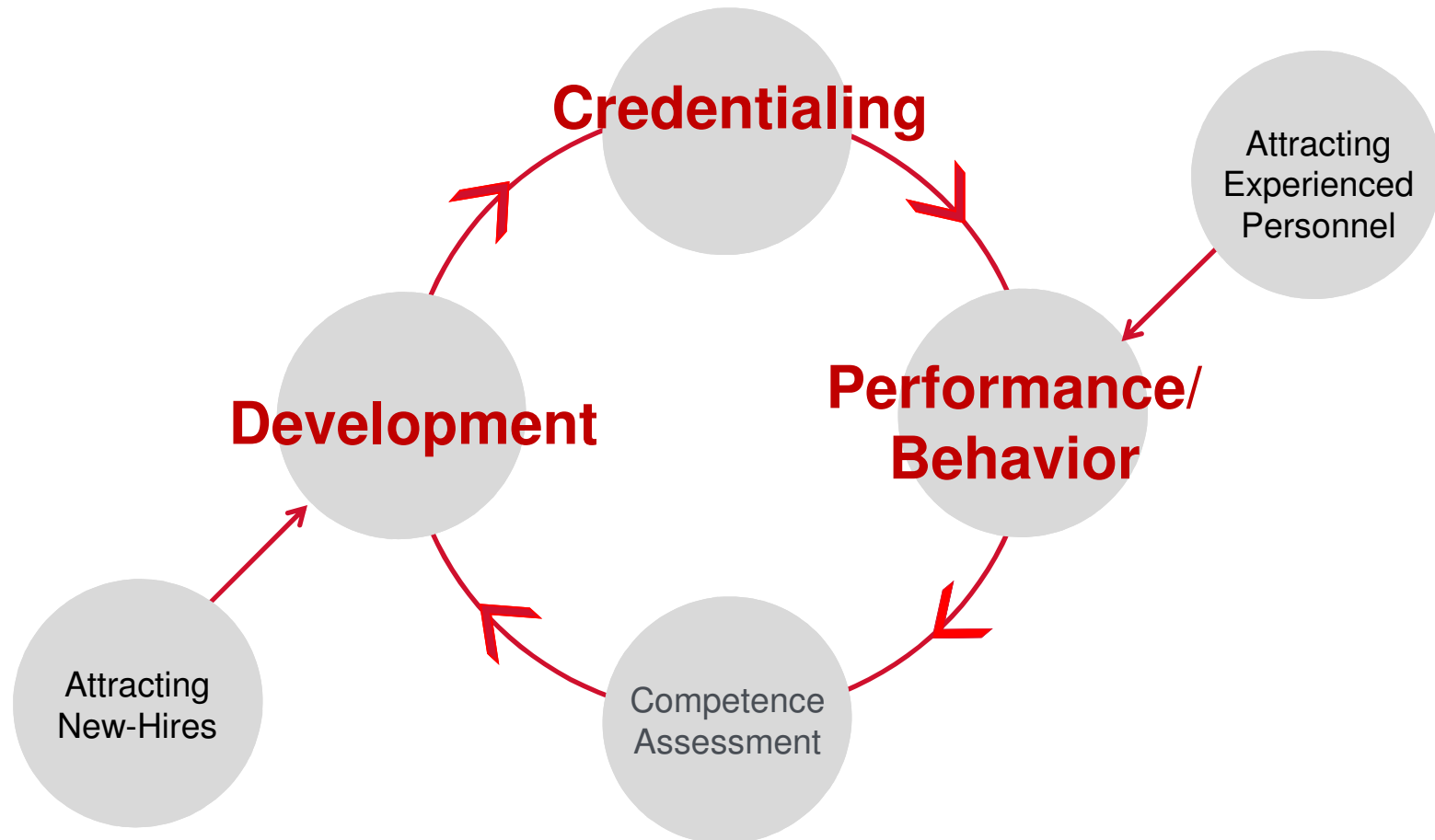

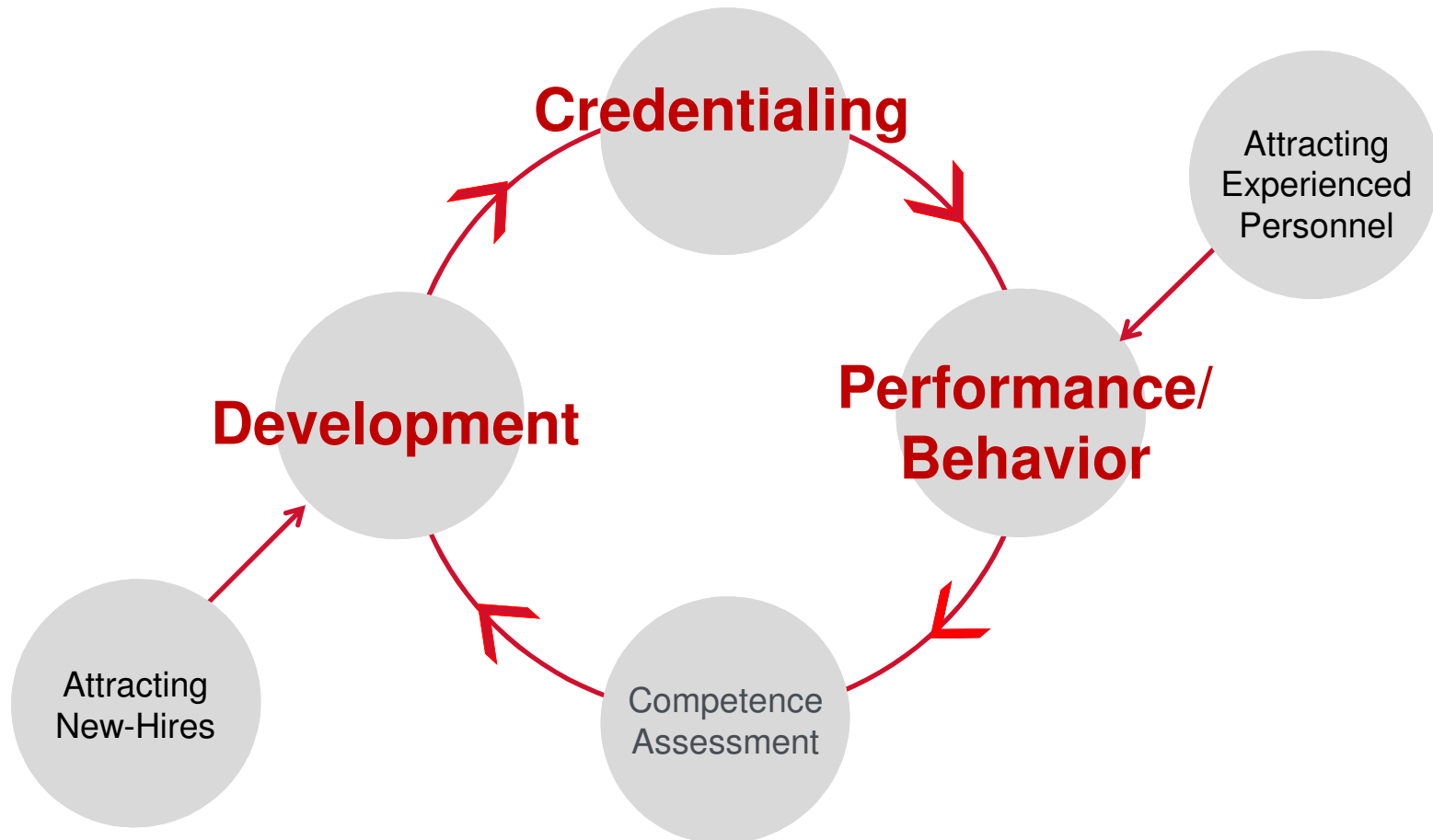
